### The Third Sunday in Ordinary Time

#### First Reading

-Isaiah 8:23-9:3

*"In Galilee of the Gentiles, the people have seen a great light."*

#### Responsorial Psalm

-Psalm 27:1,4,13-14

*"The Lord is my light and my salvation."*

#### Second Reading

-1 Corinthians 1:10-13,17

*"That all of you may agree in what you say, and that there be no divisions among you."*

#### Gospel Reading

-Matthew 4:12-23

*"Jesus went to Capernaum, so that what had been said through Isaiah might be fulfilled."*



#### Reflection on the Gospel

Today's gospel begins with news of John the Baptist being arrested. This prompts Jesus to go to Galilee, to appear there just as written with the prophet Isaiah. Also here in this gospel passage is the calling of the first disciples.

John's imperative was, "Repent, for the kingdom of heaven is at hand" (Matthew 3:2). With his role as the precursor now severely limited with his imprisonment, Jesus continues that imperative in Galilee. The difference between the two men, is that John is like the rest of us; we cannot enter the kingdom without Jesus. At this point, the Old Testament is still being fulfilled.

Here we see the calling of the first disciples. These men were just simple fishermen surviving with their day-to-day life, nothing special. Jesus first calls Simon and his brother Andrew with, "Come after me, and I will make you fishers of men" (4:19). Likewise, Jesus approached James and John, most likely with the same invitation. These four men have a few things in common: First, they listened to Jesus' invitation. Secondly, they left behind their old ways of life. Simon and Andrew left their nets behind while James and John left their father behind with his boat (most likely a family business).

After the calling of the four men, Jesus starts his ministry by teaching in Galilee's synagogues and healing the sick. Stating the obvious, Jesus is the great light that appeared in this Gentile district's darkness. The greatness of what appeared before these people is only the beginning. Appearing in a Gentile district has a meaning as well; this great light is not only for the Jewish people but for everyone who is willing to believe in the Son of God.

Are we responding to an imperative that was said 2000 years ago? Hearing the good news and, for some of us, experiencing the great light, are we responding to repent? The kingdom of God is at hand; let us pray to be receptive to Jesus and to whatever greatness he is calling us to witness.

**Black & Indian Missions**

Mandated by the III Plenary Council in 1884, the 125-year-old National Collection for Black and Indian people continues as the embodiment of the Church's concern for evangelizing the Black and Indian peoples of the United States. The funds are distributed as grants to dioceses throughout the United States, supporting and strengthening evangelization programs which otherwise would cease. The Collection was formerly known as The Black and Indian Home Mission Collection

**Church in Latin America**

The Collection for the Church in Latin America supports pastoral programs as awarded by the Subcommittee on the Church in Latin America throughout Latin America and the Caribbean. Projects include the work of evangelization, formation of laity, religious and seminarians, as well as youth ministry and catechesis. Funding is limited to programmatic expenses and excludes building construction except in cases of emergency.

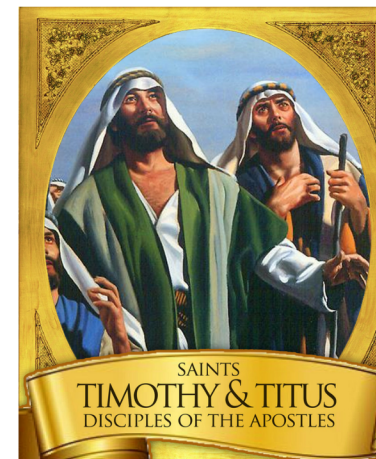

Saints Timothy and Titus were close companions and trusted co-workers of Saint Paul, whom he appointed as leaders of early Christian communities. Timothy served as bishop of Ephesus, while Titus guided the Church in Crete, helping to strengthen faith and good order among believers. Their lives remind Christians of faithful leadership, sound teaching, and perseverance in spreading the Gospel.

Saint Thomas Aquinas was a Dominican priest and brilliant theologian who used reason and faith together to explain Christian beliefs. He is remembered for teaching that truth comes from both God's revelation and human reason working in harmony.

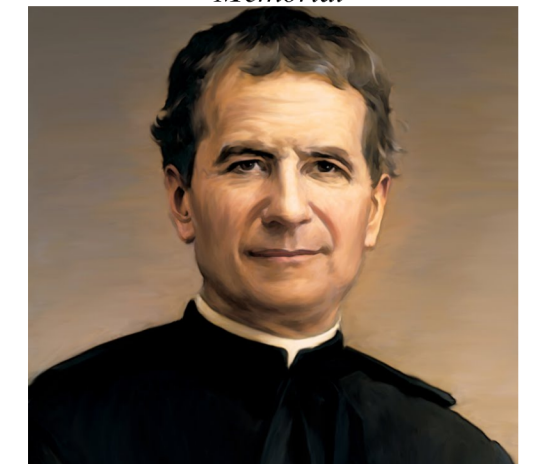

Saint John Bosco was an Italian priest who dedicated his life to educating and caring for poor and at-risk youth in the 19th century. He founded the Salesians, a religious order focused on teaching through kindness, reason, and faith. His life reminds us that patience, joy, and love can lead young people closer to God.
