

Saint Leo the Great


Memorial



Saint Leo the Great was a pope in the 5th century who protected the Church during difficult times and taught clearly about Jesus being both fully God and fully human. He is well known for courageously meeting Attila the Hun and persuading him to spare Rome. The Church honors him as a Doctor of the Church for his strong leadership and powerful writings.

About Today's Feast Day...

The Catholic Church celebrates the Feast of the Dedication of the Lateran Basilica because it is the oldest and highest-ranking church in Rome, often called the "Mother and Head" of all churches. This feast honors the dedication of the basilica, which is the cathedral church of the pope as Bishop of Rome. It reminds Catholics of the unity of the Church, rooted in the leadership of the pope and the ancient Christian community. The celebration also encourages the faithful to see themselves as living temples of God's presence in the world.

Reflection on the Readings

If Jesus did what he did in our present day, he'd be arrested on the spot. How did his father's house become defiled after so long? It starts with good intentions, that were eventually abused.

The Jewish Passover was in a few days, and pilgrims gathered from different countries to celebrate this occasion. Before having travelers from afar, people brought their own sacrifices to the temple, and the priest would assist them (Leviticus 16:32-33). Over time, the faith became widespread to different countries, meaning different currencies to deal with. Who knows how the temple spiraled into a thieves' den? Maybe the Pharisees started charging rent on such vendors for maintaining the temple, or some of the vendors, themselves, were the unsavory sort. Why did Jesus spill the money-changers' coins? It simply became a business that didn't help the people of God, but rather abused their act of goodwill. The pilgrims were being overcharged for their offerings.

Notice that the temple guards nor anyone tried to stop Jesus. Those in the charge of the Temple knew if they tried to step in, it would only enforce Jesus' point in clearing out the temple and would expose the corruption of those involved. However, clearing out the temple has a deeper meaning as the author uses *misunderstanding* as part of not fully understanding Jesus. When Jesus talks about his body being the temple, the Jews misunderstood in thinking Jesus was talking about the same temple he caused a ruckus in.

Our physical bodies are our temples, and we ought to take care of them. Each of us houses the Holy Spirit (1 Corinthians 3:16). Would that suffice in taking better care of ourselves? We also help build each other up. After all, is the church the building or those who worship in it? Regardless of the answer, we ourselves may need to reflect on our current lives and see if we are holy, internally.



Neocatechumenal Way

An Announcement of Joy! Does God still speak to us today as He did in the time of Abraham and the Exodus from the slavery of Egypt? If Jesus said he would be with his Church until the end of time, then where is he today? Many of us believe that Jesus Christ is still present today in the same way he has always been since his Ascension, but our lived experience suggests that it is more of a faint hope than a lived experience. But to discover that the history of Abraham's journey of faith is identical to our own, and the escape of Moses and the Hebrew people from the bondage of slavery is no different than what the Lord wants to accomplish in us today is to discover Him speaking to us in His Word. And to meet Jesus Christ, this same Word made flesh, in his Church. This discovery is the beginning of walking in a way of faith in a Community of concrete brothers and sisters, not as an anonymous person within a mass of people but in the communion of the One, Holy, Catholic and Apostolic Church.
