Reflection on the Gospel

First Reading

-1 Samuel 16:1b,6-7,10-13a
"David is anointed as king of Israel."

Responsorial Psalm

-Psalm 23:1-3a,3b-45,6
"The Lord is my shepherd; there is nothing I shall want."

Second Reading

-Ephesians 5:8-14
"Arise from the dead, and Christ will give you light."

Gospel Reading

-John 4:5-42
"The water that I shall give will become a spring of eternal life."

There is a great sense of irony with this Sunday's gospel passage. Here we have a man that was born blind, cured by Jesus. That man would eventually be questioned.

Notice the disciples asking who had sinned, the man or his parents? People born with infirmities and/or disabilities are often thought their parents or some ancestor had sinned. Jesus corrects such ignorance and said neither had sinned. He then spat on the ground and made clay with the earth and his saliva. Perhaps an act to repair an "earthly" vessel along with washing in Siloam. The man is cured from his blindness after he washes.

The irony starts as the man, who people knew was born blind, is now walking around with eyes opened and preaching that Jesus had cured him. The Pharisees questioned this man and how he was cured. As the event happened on the Sabbath, Jesus was eventually marked as ungodly. However, how can a sinful man do such things as asked by those present?

The man's parents were also questioned; they confirmed their parentage but the healing they refer back to him. They were afraid of being dismissed from the synagogue. The cured man, who is probably annoyed with the repeated questions, tells them the honest truth and their contradictions. The Pharisees did not know who or where Jesus came from, but they know such an act of healing is of God's. They continue to deny who Jesus is, since the man spoke against the Pharisees, the man was cast out from the synagogue.

Jesus, hearing of what happened, came to the man. The man was cast out from the faith he grew up in and, by extension, abandoned by his parents. After Jesus reveals himself to the man, the man immediately believes and worships the Son of Man. The Pharisees then ask Jesus if they were not blind. If they were blind, they wouldn't have to deal with the truth in front of them. The Pharisees have sight, but decided to be blind to the truth. While the man born blind, used his newly obtained sight and believed the truth in front of him.

Blindness isn't necessarily a bad thing. Blindness becomes a problem when we ignore the Truth in front of us. Just because we can physically see, doesn't mean we can see spiritually. Maybe it's a harsh truth we've denied for years? Let us pray for the acceptance we need in our lives, so that we can live freely in Truth.

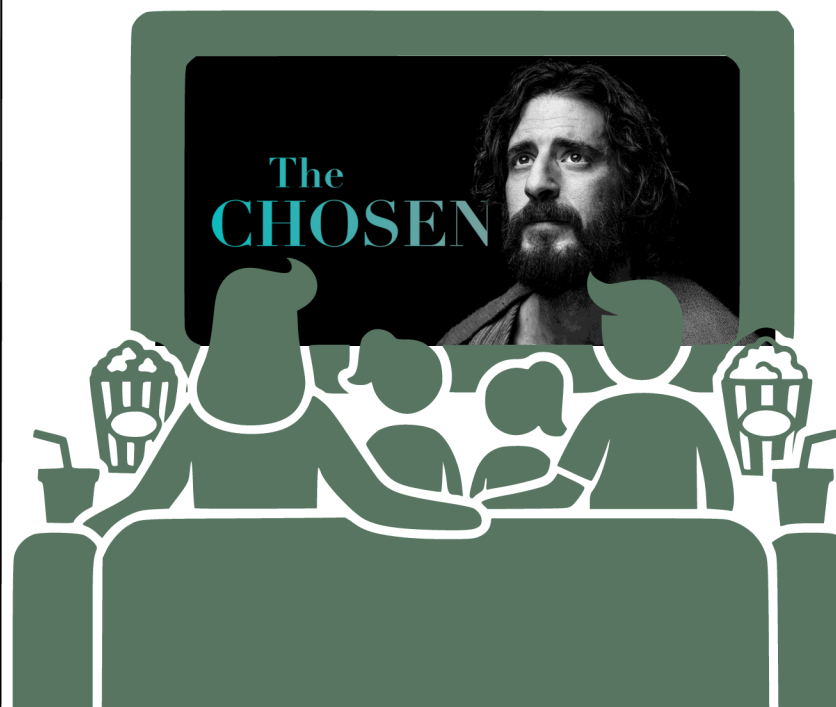

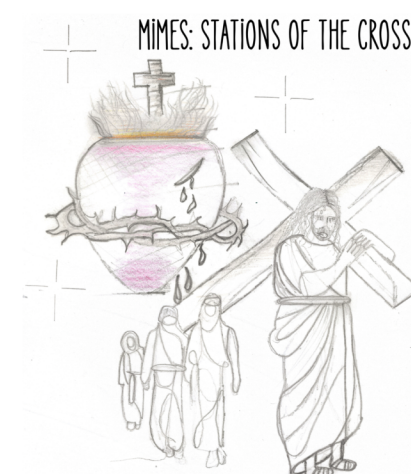
