Jesus enters Jerusalem and is welcomed with palms, but the Passion is also proclaimed, reminding us of what is to come.

Monday of Holy Week

Jesus cleanses the Temple and calls people to true worship and repentance.

Tuesday of Holy Week

Jesus teaches in Jerusalem and speaks about faithfulness, betrayal, and the coming of the Kingdom.

Wednesday of Holy Week (Spy Wednesday)

Judas Iscariot agrees to betray Jesus, marking the growing tension before His Passion.

Holy Thursday

Jesus celebrates the Last Supper, institutes the Eucharist and priesthood, and washes the disciples' feet.

Good Friday

We remember the suffering and death of Jesus on the Cross; it is a day of fasting, prayer, and solemn reflection.

Holy Saturday

A quiet day of waiting as Jesus rests in the tomb; the Church prepares for the Resurrection.

Easter (Easter Sunday)

Jesus rises from the dead, conquering sin and death, and bringing new life to the world.

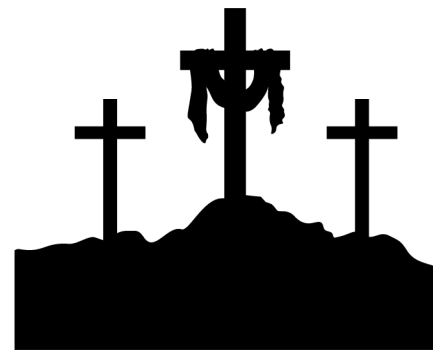

Reflection on Palm Sunday

It is customary on Palm Sunday to be part of a procession while holding palms. It is to greet Jesus as king. This king has appeared riding on a donkey. How many of us would be taken aback, especially if we didn't know from Zachariah 9:9? Many of us there would expect something more majestic and noble rather than meek and humble.

What is the difference between those people who greeted Jesus and us to this present day? Aside from the obvious differences, nothing much if we think about it. Daily life struggles, praying to God, and many more similarities than differences. Ordinary folks greeted Jesus as he processed into Jerusalem, laying down palm branches. People would then rejoice, "Hosanna, Hosanna, the king is here!"

Now what are the differences between us and the people who wanted Jesus to be crucified? Same as before, but how many of those same people that greeted Jesus became disappointed in what they saw and heard? How many of those same people cried out, "Crucify him! Crucify him!" However, even with such a mindset, who was the first to call Jesus a "Son of God" after he died? An unnamed, ordinary Roman centurion and a Gentile on top of that. This soldier witnessed how much Jesus loves his people, even unto death. After all, no selfish man would be so passionate to accept his execution and even ask his God to forgive his executioners.

With our mouths, we can curse people and with those same mouths we can bless. How do we use our words to the Jesus within the person across from us? The Son of Man lived amongst us, ministered to those who needed to be ministered to, and taught his disciples to do the same. On top of that, the Son of God took on human flesh, meaning Jesus was human too. Within our ordinary lives, Jesus calls to do the extraordinary with him. The extraordinary would be bringing back ourselves and others into God's love.

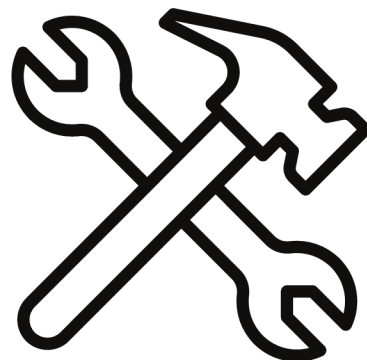

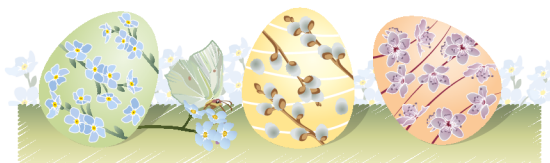

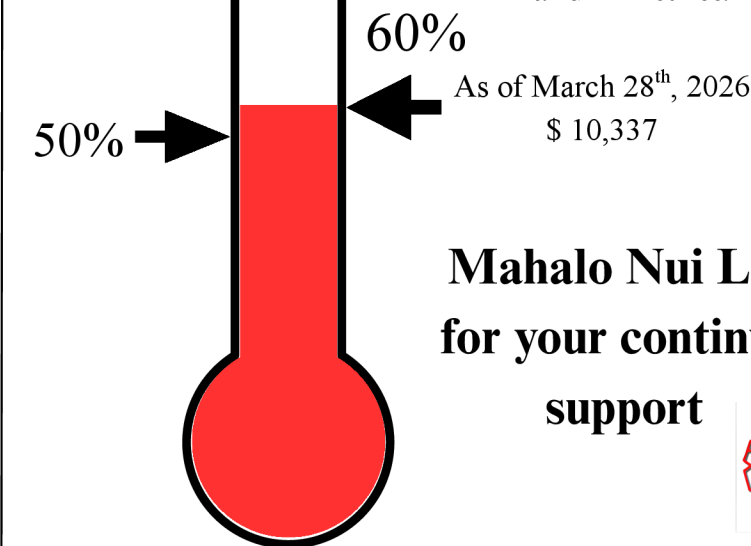
